

#### Parish Council Update—Autumn 2023

#### **New Parish Office Staff**

### Councillor Vacancy – your parish needs YOU!

Following May's uncontested election, there is still one vacancy on the Parish Council. If you would like to make a real contribution to your community, why not consider putting yourself forward to become a Councillor? It's a very rewarding role and you can find full details on our

#### Planning Application for 20 Homes on Land of Everton Nurseries

An application to build 20 new homes on land of Everton Nurseries was objected to by the Parish Council. Although the Council welcomed the provision of 10 affordable homes in the scheme, it had concerns about the impact on highway safety, the character and appearance of the area, effect on the openness of the Greenbelt, impact on public open space and also the ecology of the area. #### SS8 - Land off Hordle Lane for 155 homes

The Parish Council recently voted to object to Bargate Homes' application to build 155 homes on land off Hordle Lane (SS8). Although the provision of affordable homes was welcome, the Parish Council had concerns about traffic and highway safety, car parking, footpaths & connectivity, housing density, community safety, allotment provision, education provision and the effect on ecology and protected species. Although this development is in Hordle, there is likely to be an effect on traffic flow in Everton, particularly when combined with approved plan for 97 more homes off Everton Road in Hordle (SS9) and housing developments in Pennington. The full response can also be read on our website.

#### New Accessible Picnic table at Everton Recreation Ground

The Parish Council is in the process of installing a new, fully accessible picnic table at Everton Recreation Ground This has been made possible by grants from County Councillor Carpenter and District Councillor Hawkins.

#### **Speedwatch Team Targets Volunteers**

We are looking for more volunteers to join the friendly Community Speedwatch Team team which records speeding vehicles at locations around the parish to keep our roads safe. Full training is given – for details visit the volunteering page of our website or contact the Parish Office.

#### **Parish Council Van**

The Parish Council has acquired a van for use by the Groundsman on his duties. The van has been paid for through funds from the Community Infrastructure Levy. Look out for it around the parish.



#### **Clean Up for the Coronation**

The parish-wide litter pick on 29th April was a great success, with over 20 bags of rubbish collected from the streets of Everton and Hordle.

I am sure you will all agree we have not had the best weather this summer, although we did manage to celebrate working and living in the village for seven years on a lovely Sunday in June. Time has passed so quickly and Barrie, Emma and I are all still very happy here.

The Post office seems to be getting busier lately. Many of our customers need to withdraw money, pay bills, deposit cheques and cash, luckily with so many banks closing we can help. We also offer travel services, euros on demand and other currencies available to order. Travel insurance and travel cards are also services provided. We are now agents for Evri parcel services, drop offs and collections. Gift cards are available, one 4 all and Amazon, which are great for last minute presents.

I am sorry everyone but talking about time passing quickly it can only mean one thing, we are now thinking about Christmas!

Stock will start arriving over the next few weeks with cards, wrapping paper, gift bags, chocolates and hopefully lots of the more unusual tasty treats that will appear on the shelves.

Noah's Arc Farm who supplies us with lovely fresh free-range eggs and chicken will as usual be suppling us with tasty local free-range whole turkeys, crowns and breast rolled meat. Newhouse game will take orders for their three-bird roast, venison joints, partridge, pheasant, sausages etc. Joints and other meats will be available to order from the New Forest bacon Co. Crab, lobster, salmon, scallops and prawns can all be pre-ordered subject to availability supplied by Flip N Tails.

Hampshire Summerdown mint chocolate range, teas and lovely soaps, lotion, candle and diffuser make great presents. We have increased the range from the IOW garlic farm to include garlic beer, marmalade and chutneys also Yarty cordials and their very tasty black garlic balsamic vinegar all available on the Hampshire stand.

Local company Fabulous Catch now also supply us with great quiches, which are lovely for unexpected visitors as well as the popular fishcakes and mackerel pate. I don't think people need reminding but for those of you that have not heard of or tried the amazing oak smoked trout pate from the New Forest Smokery, you can find it in our chiller! You will also find several delicious varieties of Lyburn cheese along with the IOW blue and soft cheese.

Hampshire sparkling wines and beers make lovely gifts for friends and family and will elevate your Christmas celebrations along with local and IOW gin and spiced rum.

I can with confidence recommend the Hattingley Valley rose sparkling wine, as in the name of research I have consumed quite a lot just to make sure that it is consistently good!!

Hopefully weather permitting we can hold the Christmas carol service outside the shop once again this year (date to be confirmed). It really makes it feel like Christmas for us and seeing so many people attend last year, I think lots of you also agree.

By the time you read this we will be ordering our Easter eggs, we have to plan so far in advance so please forgive us for talking about Christmas so early!

### A report by Toby Sears, Chairman of the Pavilion Committee

Everton Pavilion is a resource for our community, available for hire by anyone in or outside of Everton and situated in the heart of the village. It can be reached from Frys Lane where there is a parking area or on foot across the recreation ground via Greenmead Avenue. The Pavilion is a Registered Charity (No 294875) and is managed by a committee of volunteers for the benefit of the village.

By the time you read this we will have had our AGM and I hope we found some volunteers to join our committee, it's a struggle to find people these days who are willing to help keep groups and activities going. We are lucky that we still have enough committee members to keep the pavilion open for villagers but were sad to lose Jackie May, our secretary, after many years supporting the pavilion and she was presented with a token of our thanks.

We had a busy summer refitting the kitchen, purchasing more kitchen equipment and replacing boiler. We were extremely grateful to New Forest District Council who approved our Grant Application for 1/3rd of the kitchen refit.

Other maintenance work included replacing the wooden car park fence, after an incident of vandalism. With assistance from the Parish Council, we were able to upgrade the fence with metal railings.

The improvements to the Pavilion are down to our hirers supporting us as a village venue and in turn the villagers who support those groups so.



please have a look at our calendar and consider taking up an activity or supporting events! As always, we have many activities for villagers, Pilates, Yoga, Zumba, Meditation, Art, Dance. The Pavilion is the venue for a "drop in" group, open to anyone with any disability or who just wants some company.

On top of several regular private hires for U3A groups and band practices we have been hired for parties as well as being the refreshment stop for the New Forest Classic, a non-competitive cycle ride through the forest. And also, the hub for the successful ECA coronation event. In July the wonderful Brasstastic held their free annual village concert too. Thanks to Amy Taylor for bringing the youth music group to the pavilion.

# Victoria Sponge Recipe Pumpkin Day Competition (1st October)



### Ingredients:

6oz/175g Soft Margarine

6oz/175g Caster Sugar

6oz/175g Self Raising Flour

3 Eggs

1 teaspoon Baking Powder

#### Method:

Place all ingredients in a mixing bowl and beat with a wooden spoon until well mixed (2-3 minutes)

Divide the mixture between two greased and bottom lined 7inch sandwich tins

Bake in the centre of a preheated oven, 170 degrees C or Gas Mark 3 for approximately 25-30 minutes

Turnout and cool on a wire tray

Must be filled with Jam only.

Dust top with Caster Sugar



At the time of writing, it is late August again and I am just finished on day three of the Hampshire Open Studios event that happens every year. This year the ten day county wide event has absolutely raced round and it is great to see so many entries of other artists and creatives in the little pink book that marks the occasion.

I am sharing a space with three other painters based in Claire's magnificent garden studio in Milford on Sea, and it's been a great start to the event. We have a lot of our paintings and cards of our artworks on display, chatted to lots of visitors, selling cards and paintings and on day two, after the breezy wind dropped, set up an outside painting area in the garden shade. This made a wonderful meet and greet space and a talking point about the paintings that we were working on.

My artwork this year is reflecting a lot about the local sea wall, the walks along there, and the myriad of vegetation that grows on the shingle beach and saltmarsh locally. A constant favourite of mine is the sea kale plant, or Crambe maritma plant;

a large posy of cabbage like leaves, with delicate small white flowers that transform into pearl like pea pods later in the year. A fascinating plant, which is said to have a very long roots, and one I always enjoy painting about. It resonates with the increasing number of people who have bought sea kale paintings from me too.

I have heard customers say that my paintings transport them to the sea wall, to walks that they know so well, and this gives them a sense of happiness and peace; it's amazing what paint and an artistic eye can do!

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#### Net Zero or Not Net Zero?

One of the many topics that splits public opinion presently is Net Zero. I hear opposing views on the radio and amongst councillor colleagues and friends about how and when we should achieve Net Zero, or whether to bother with it at all. That the concept is some sort of conspiracy to control the public and even the 'world order'. On TV there are experts, politicians, celebrities and businesses peddling Net Zero as an absolute and that we need to reach it by 2030 or sooner.



And then there are the, young activists of the world, shouting at us that we must stop Climate Change (but not really explaining how). The truth probably falls somewhere in between the extremities spoken by both sides of the argument.

My thoughts on this, as someone who has always been very interested in looking after the environment (which not many would disagree with is a perfectly acceptable aim) is that we should be talking less in terms of Net Zero and Climate Change, but putting the arguments across in more palatable and understandable terms for those who may be turned off by what has now become 'climate jargon'.

We should be talking more about practical things we can do in conservation work to help our wildlife. We have wonderful conservation groups in our area. But they exist all over the country, in the cities as well as rural areas. There is some terrific work going on. If everyone committed to join one and help out once a month, think what could be achieved across the country.

We should be talking more about how we can reduce air pollution to create cleaner air for us and creatures we share the planet with. We should be talking about whether electric cars are the answer to this. Many say they are not, coming with their own problems in the building and disposing of the batteries, yet alone the cost of them. And again, people feel forced to spend money on new cars (which is surely in itself a wasteful process, getting rid of cars that work perfectly well). Are there better solutions?

And we should be talking more about how we can reduce, or better still, eliminate waste products, whether it be wasted food - or plastic or other damaging materials. Can we stop making things from plastic completely? Is there a cost effective and environmentally friendly biodegradable alternative? We surely have the brains and means to invent and produce such materials as replacements for plastic.

Governments and councils cannot achieve their environmental aims alone. The public needs to be on side and acting alongside them, willingly taking their lead on these matters.

And if you are someone who is sceptical about 'green issues' or Net Zero, can you think about it differently and put those terms aside? Instead, can you think about what you might do to help wildlife in your own garden (creating habitat areas for insects, small mammals, birds or aquatic life).

Think about how you can reduce your car usage or can you adapt your car in some way to reduce emissions? (My father's old M-reg van has a filter fitted which meets ULEZ emission levels. If he can do that, others can too, not very expensively.) And think about how your household can reduce the amount of waste it throws away in the black bin bag each week.

Hampshire County Council are taking what I consider a pragmatic approach to the environment and moving towards Net Zero, both in its own operations and in its aim to encourage the public to take action. As well as reducing carbon, an important part of their Action Plan is to prepare people and the environment to adapt to a rise in temperature of 2 degrees by 2050. This is something not all councils make provision for in their climate change policies. And I think it is the right approach. Because no-one really knows how much humans will be able to halt or slow climate change. No-one. All we can do is try to make the environment better for ourselves and the flora and fauna of the world that we rely on.


